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Conservatory Notes and Photos

Notes on the Conservatory

How did your orchids survive the inferno? How did you survive?

This summer there were 32 days that the temperature exceeded 100*F – obviously a pitiful record. The only thing that struggled worse than my plants was my A/C. And, Yes, there were casualties in the orchid family. Some of the high mountain oncidiums, like the miltoniopsis, are no longer with us. And some of the new mounts we attempted in July just never had a chance to put out a root system. (R.I.P.)

Many orchids seemed to drastically slow or even shut down growth, waiting for a more temperate climate. But I was shocked how pleasant it seemed last week to be outside in 90*F weather and it made me appreciate the more normal high.

This was a test of the extreme. Certainly one we would have never purposely devised. But it taught us a lot. Very few orchids succumbed. Out of a few thousand in the Conservatory, I doubt we lost twenty. Some of them seemed to enjoy the triple digits, including our dendrobiums, myrmecophila hybrids, and many cattleyas. Even the phalaenopsis (with its known temperamental characteristic) this summer threw out a second flower spike. What an interesting experiment!

This month-long internment in hades made me more assured than before. If you want to grow a near indestructible plant that can take all the tribulations of our Gulf South, orchids are the way to go!
